Recipe

Tuscan bean soup - By Kirra Moser

1 onion

2-3 cloves garlic

2-4 sprigs rosemary (leaves only)

2 tins beans cannelini/aduki.

(Whatever beans you like though I tend to use one dark and one light)

1 tin chopped tomatos or tin passata

1 tbsn mixed herbs

500ml veg stock.

Fry onions, garlic, rosemary in oil until soft. Add tomatos, herbs, stock & 1/2 tin of each beans. Mix well and blend to

Calling the side of Science

I was born in a laboratory, almost. Our spare bedroom was like a library but instead of books

its shelves were filled with chemicals in glass jars and all kinds of intriguing apparatus. And the bathroom was equipped with retort stands and Bunsen



burners for reflux experiments. Wonderful hydrogen explosions, magnesium flares, sodium metal spitting and hissing orange and purple fire in the bath; sulphuric and nitric acid dissolving minerals and metals, a bottle of 'kills in one whiff' cyanide; lovely fruity smells of bottles of reagents, amyl acetate - pears, benzyl acetate - strawberries, acetone, ether, chloroform! All arrestable offences these days maybe. These were all part of my young childhood. No wonder I loved science.

Recently the leading genetic scientist Richard Lewontin, coolly remarked in The New York Review of Books "We take the side of science in spite of the patent absurdity of some of its constructs, in spite of its failure to fulfil many of its extravagant promises of health and life, in spite of the tolerance of the scientific community for unsubstantiated just-so stories". I still love science but I did not sign up to that. Richard Lewontin does because, he explains, "we cannot allow a Divine foot in the door." Awkward.

So just what are these fairytales that Richard Lewontin says you must tolerate in order to 'take the side of science'? Prehistoric archaeology always required some good imaginative stories, but now palaeontology (fossils), evolution (Darwinism) and cosmology are all indulging in phantasmagorical scenarios

that can never be tested experimentally. Are these the 'unsubstantiated just-so stories' and are they really believable?

Just one obvious example that troubled Darwin is this: if his theory of evolution were true "there would be in every species a constant and ruthless competition to survive: a competition in which only a few in each generation can be winners". But it is perfectly obvious that human life is not like that and never could have been, however it may be with other species. In fact the inconsistency between Darwin's theory and the facts is so very obvious that no Darwinian has ever been unconscious of it or in fact able to explain it. And if Darwin's theory is not true for the human species, it is not true - end of. Consequently there have been many attempts to wriggled out of Darwin's dilemma. But the inconsistency is just too simple and direct to be wriggled out of. Nevertheless the wriggling has been great and resulted in many Just So stories

of what must have happened long, long ago and far, far away, leaving no trace of evidence to be found. I will join Richard Lewontin and 'take

the side of Science' but I will put the Just-So stories back on the right shelf marked Fantasy-Fiction where they can be properly enjoyed.
