These British missionaries and many others are counting on your support. The sufferers from leprosy, malaria, dysentery, yaws, and other terrible diseases, look wistfully to you for help. The millions in ignorance and superstition call to you out of their heathen darkness. They ask you to send them teachers and preachers of the Gospel.

Our Lord Himself, the One who paid the price of our redemption, earnestly pleads with every one of us to do our part, "that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations." Luke 24:47.

We believe you will respond, particularly when you remember that every Ingathering leaflet also bears an invitation to the recipient to study the Bible at home through the Voice of Prophecy correspondence courses, which have been so fruitful in building up a stronger Adventist membership here in Britain.

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


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

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## MORE ABOUT SOME OF THE BRITISH WORKERS SERVING IN MISSION LANDS

- 1. Pastor B. E. Sparrow of Wimbledon left Nottingham in 1946 for mission service in Angola, West Africa. His wife, the daughter of Pastor and Mrs. G. D. Keough, pioneer missionaries to Egypt, was born in Cairo. At present Pastor Sparrow is on the staff of Helderberg Missionary College, South Africa.
- 2. MISS G. A. CLARKE of Watford, during thirtythree years of mission service to East Africa has spent much time in translation work for the British and Foreign Bible Society.
- 3. PASTOR AND MRS. G. D. KEOUGH, of Govan, Scotland, and Leeds, respectively, are veteran missionaries, having commenced service in Egypt in 1908. Pastor Keough's knowledge of Arabic and his wide experience in Moslem lands, is greatly valued. He is now stationed at Beirut, Lebanon.
- 4. PASTOR AND MRS. A. C. LEBUTT, of Barrow-in-Furness, Lancs., have served since 1919 in Rhodesia, Belgian Congo, Bechuanaland, and the Union of South Africa.
- 5. NURSE PHYLLIS STANDEN, of Watford, has ministered to Africa's sick and afflicted since 1948, at Gitwe Mission Dispensary, Belgian Congo.
- 6. Pastor H. S. Pearce, of London, and his wife (née Winnie Prosser of Bargoed, South Wales), both workers from The Stanborough Press Ltd., Watford, sailed for the Gold Coast in 1946. Pastor Pearce is manager of the Advent Press Accra.
- 7. Pastor C. T. J. Hyde, of Garston, Watford, entered mission service in Kenya in 1930. After teaching for many years at Kamagambo Training School he was appointed Principal of Bugema Missionary College, Uganda.
- 8. MRS. E. BJAANES (née Pattie Parker) of Nottingham, with her husband, Pastor Erling Bjaanes, of Norway, left for mission service at Addis Ababa in Ethiopia in 1946.
- 9. Pastor W. H. Hurlow, of Cardiff, has rendered over forty years of faithful service in the mission field, having laboured in the Union of South Africa, Basutoland, Nyasaland, Bechuanaland, and the Rhodesias. He is now president of the Rhodesia-Bechuanaland field.
- 10. Pastor W. C. S. Raitt and his wife (née Hilda Green), both of Watford, have given valued mission service in East Africa since 1929, including many years among the Kikuyu tribe of Kenya. They now labour in the Zambesi Union Mission.
- 11. MISS INA WHITE, of The Stanborough Press Ltd., Watford, went to India in 1947 to connect with The Oriental Watchman Publishing House, Poona. She is now Editor of Eastern Tidings.
- 12. PASTOR EDGAR BROOKES of Plymouth, first went to Peru as a self-supporting worker in 1911. After service in Peru and Argentina, he married Miss Dora Waterhouse of Birmingham. These two have laboured together for a further twenty-eight years.

- 13. PASTOR S. G. MAXWELL of Hove, Sussex, since 1920 has done mission service in Kenya, Tanganyika, Nyasaland, and Rhodesia. He is now president of the Zambesi Union Mission.
- 14. PASTOR W. S. NEWMAN, of Wimbledon, and his wife (née Myrtle Crookes of Lewisham) left the homeland for West Africa in 1937. Pastor Newman has been president of the East Nigeria Mission since 1947.
- 15. Pastor Stanley Bull, M.A., of Watford, and his wife (née Nancy Murdoch) after having given many years of service in Egypt are now labouring in Jamaica. Pastor Bull is head of the Theological Department of the West Indian Training College.
- 16. PASTOR W. G. TILL of Southampton accepted a call to West Africa in 1924. With his wife (née Gladys Morgan of North London), a trained nurse of Stanboroughs Hydro, he has given valuable service in the Gold Coast and Nigeria.
- 17. NURSES BERYL AND SYLVIA TURTILL, of Watford, have been ministering to the sick, and training native nurses at the Ile-Ife Hospital, Nigeria, since 1949 and 1950 respectively.
- 18. MISSIONARY RONALD CAREY, after serving for a number of years in The Stanborough Press went out to Kenya Colony as a missionary printer in 1932. After fifteen years he returned home for a short time and then went back to mission service in Kenya Colony in 1948.
- 19. DR. JOHN A. HYDE and his wife (née Myrtle Richter) of Watford. Reared in Nigeria and thus well acquainted with its people and language, this son of Pastor J. J. Hyde, one of our veteran missionaries, has given medical service at Jengre, Jos, Northern Nigeria, since 1945, assisted by his wife, a qualified dispenser.
- 20. Mrs. A. H. Brandt (née Pamela Cooling), of Brighton, has served with her husband at Malamulo, Nyasaland, since 1947.
- 21. MISSIONARY C. T. BANNISTER, of Bristol, and his wife (née Gladys Brett), of Watford commenced mission service in Kenya in 1940. Mrs. C. T. Bannister, who taught for some years at schools in Watford, will be well known to many former pupils.
- 22. MISSIONARY ALBERT H. WATSON was born in Kenya, of veteran missionaries to East Africa. He graduated at Newbold Missionary College in 1943 and has been science master at the Caribbean Training College, Trinidad, since 1948. His wife (née Maureen Williams, of Rhyl) also teaches at the College.
- 23. MRS. J. R. BUZENET (née Winifred Dawrant), of Stoke-on-Trent, commenced mission service with her husband in the Ivory Coast in 1951.
- 24. MISSIONARY E. E. HULBERT, of Hastings, and his wife (née Ruth Dorland) after service in South England accepted a call to West Nigeria in 1946. Their present station is at Accra, Gold Coast.
