# I Believe by Brian Davison

**RECENTLY** I had the privilege of taking part in the dedication service at Stanborough Park church of little Sébastien Guenin –son of Etienne & Carolyn (nee Cooper).

As I thought and prayed about what I should say, my mind went back to my teenage years during the 1960's. At the time, I thought that the 60's was a wonderful decade. Those years experienced the *space race* culminating in Neil Armstrong's being the first man to walk on the moon in July 1969, and of course who can forget England's winning the world cup!! Much to my parent's disapproval, I eagerly listened to Alan Freeman hosting *Top of the Pops* every Sunday afternoon.

In 1964 three young men from Ireland called *The Bachelors* released their version of the song called *I Believe* which got to number 2 in the hit parade, and I loved it. I took a risk and played the song to the church congregation during the dedication service! As I watched most of the *oldies* mouth the words and sway their heads, I knew I was OK!

I've often wondered whether the Bachelors actually believed what they sang about. Knowing that later in the decade they recorded such songs as *Walk with faith in your heart* (1966) and *I'll walk with God* (1968) I like to think that they did!

Let me remind you of the words of *I believe*:

I believe for every drop of rain that falls
A flower grows
I believe that somewhere in the darkest night
A candle glows
I believe for everyone who goes astray
Someone will come to show the way
I believe, I believe

I believe above a storm the smallest prayer
Can still be heard
I believe that someone in the great somewhere
Hears every word
Every time I hear a new born baby cry
Or touch a leaf or see the sky
Then I know why, I believe

As I thought of those words, they suggested to me that there <u>are</u> defining moments in all of our lives that bring us to the place where we recognise that there must be a supreme being and *above the storm the smallest prayer can still be heard* and that *someone in the great somewhere hears every word*.

Negative experiences can bring us to that defining moment. I well remember a Sunday Supplement headline written by a reporter holed up with terrified civilians in a bunker during the Balkan war. Being shelled from all sides, no one thought that they were going to survive. His headline was; *There are no atheists in foxholes*.

However for Etienne and Carolyn I suggested that on a positive note perhaps the most relevant section of the song was that line; *Every time I hear a new born baby cry. S*ébastien was a miracle, and as they drank in the beauty and perfection of their new born child, I'm sure it was one of those defining moments for them, when they gazed heavenward and whispered, *Do you know God, THIS is why we believe.* 

It's interesting to note that when you read the story of this world's creation as recorded in Genesis. Chapter 1 v 26 tells us that God made us in His image to be like Him. Does it mean that God created us to look like Him?...Possibly.

As God is our Creator, possibly another aspect of being made in the image of God is that He has given us also the ability to create! So I reminded Etienne and Carolyn, that God had now entrusted them with the ability to procreate another human being in the form of young Sébastien! What a privilege, what a responsibility!

Another wonderful characteristic of God is that He craves relationships, and God has passed on to us our desire for relationships, especially within a family unit.

As far as God is concerned, He desires us to develop a relationship with Him. So much so, that in the Bible, He calls us His Sons and Daughters and refers to Himself as our Father. I love what the apostle John wrote in his first letter chapter 3v1. How great is the love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God. And that is what we are.

How wonderful is that?

It may well be that the ups and downs of life and the hard knocks we have endured have caused us to seriously challenge our belief in God. Yet that doesn't alter the fact that God still considers Himself to be our Father, and calls us His Son or Daughter.

Remember, when the time is right, our Heavenly Father will be watching us from afar off and will welcome us with outstretched arms back into His family - the family of God.

### BEYOND BELIEF - Richard J B Willis MA MSc FRSPH

**THE DEPUTY EDITOR** of the *New Scientist* magazine, Graham Lawton, states: *Deep inside you is a personal guidebook that influences almost everything you do*. He goes on to ask: *How did it get there, and why is it so powerful?* Lawton is writing about belief. One thing is absolutely certain about belief, and that is there is no specific centre for belief in the brain, contrary to the sometimes sensational claims made by psychology writers with books to sell! The general consensus of modern day neuro-research is that there are no super cells, neurons, or brain chemicals solely identified with belief. So it is concluded that we self-generate what we believe based on our total culture and life experience to date. Daily we form concepts, we speculate, and we make decisions based on the evidence of all our senses.

Christians argue that the basis for belief has indeed been planted in us by a God who made us in His own image (that in itself is a belief!). Non-believing scientists demand evidence of religionists as they do of fellow researchers in their own disciplines. However, seekers after truth usually do not abandon their senses and make an arbitrary decision with regard to belief, but weigh various forms of evidence and probability using all their reasoning power to arrive at a decision. When all is said and done, there is much that science takes on faith and is dogmatic about. Why should scientists deny that same process to people of growing faith? All of us see in a glass darkly at the present time, but when we see clearly we shall see something that is truly beyond belief.
